Bobcats Abroad: A Tale of Two Siblings

Janet Beery Owers '53 and Jim Beery '59 maintained a loyal "true white and blue" combined outpost in England for 45 years.

Their father Ralph D. Beery is well known to many alumni as he taught science and mathematics at Grandview from 1934 to 1947 and was principal from 1947 to 1970. He took a break during WWII where he served in the Navy on board a destroyer escort in the Atlantic and taught aircraft recognition at Princeton.

Jim and Janet followed each other around after leaving Grandview. When Jim was at Harvard, Janet returned from a year at the University of Copenhagen to Boston and a job at Harvard. She met her future husband David. After Jim's wedding to wife Candy, Janet and David joined them on their honeymoon in San Francisco.

In 1975, Jim, Candy and daughter Jessica stopped in England en route from Japan to the States to visit Janet, David and their family, who were already living in England. Jim's law firm asked him to spend a week or

two working in its London office. Those two weeks stretched into nearly 45 years. Jim and Candy settled in London, just 60 miles from Janet and David in Cambridge.

Family gatherings for Thanksgiving dinner became possible with suitcases full of the necessary ingredients brought back to England from summer vacations in the States – cranberry sauce, Stove Top stuffing, canned pumpkin. It was a challenge to find a turkey.

The Thanksgiving story is not part of the English school curriculum. At first, the children had no understanding of the Pilgrims of Plymouth Plantation and the first Thanksgiving. But, by the time the grandchildren were around the table, the tradition was firmly established and began with First Community Church's Dr. Roy Burkhardt's benediction as Grace:

"The love that makes the family and that alone can build the peace of the world ... be with you now and forever more."

Somehow, they always managed to find a football game on TV and the Ohio State marching band playing in the background. When TBDBITL came to England in 2015 as halftime entertainment for an NFL game, Janet and Jim were there to cheer them on.

Over the years, Janet and Jim spent many vacations together and are grateful that their children and grandchildren are close friends. A recent get-together was a collective family marathon with the two five year olds running a mile each.

For Jim, practicing law took him

across the globe, with stints in New York, Tokyo and London, including nine years as the general counsel of GlaxoSmith-Kline. Janet spent 30 years at Cambridge University's Department of Architecture Research Division and is now director of a company that markets that research.

As the siblings say, "Grandview is in our DNA. We will always be kids from Ohio at heart. It is wonderful for us to stay in touch with our Grandview friends and the truly extraordinary community of Grandview Heights, Ohio. In the words of our Alma Mater, 'Our loyalty to thee shall never falter.'"

Physical transformation of Grandview Heights Schools begins soon

December marked one year since the passage of Issue 6 - the combined bond issue and operating levy that allows Grandview Heights Schools to maintain its current programming and operations and enable the district to implement the Facilities Master Plan.

The plan includes a comprehensive renovation of Grandview Heights High School, a rebuild of Edison Intermediate/Larson Middle School, and safety, security and ADA upgrades at all of our school buildings.

Design phase of the project was just completed and the district's architects facilitated workshops and meetings with staff, community members and students on the design of our new and upgraded school facilities.

The district created multiple committees to review and provide feedback to the process and hosted community meetings so all stakeholders were actively engaged from start to finish. With that feedback, the buildings were designed to prepare students for today's modern world.

In January, residents can expect to see large equipment and fencing appear around the schools, as well as modified traffic patterns and changes in

access to sidewalks and parking lots.

Anyone who's built or renovated a home knows that it can sometimes be disruptive to daily routines. Our goal is to work with families, staff and community to make the process as smooth and safe as possible.

For the latest information on the Facilities Master Plan, visit the district's website www.ghschools.org and click on "Facilities Planning." The district will post video updates and monthly drone flights so residents can follow construction progress.

We are organizing an official groundbreaking in January. Details will be shared soon and we hope you will join us.

We remain committed to our goal of completing the project on time and on budget. The plan is to complete all ADA and safety upgrades by summer 2022 and have students attend school in the new 4-8 building and renovated high school by winter 2023.

It's an exciting time to be a Bobcat. We are humbled and grateful to the community for their support of our schools. We look forward to providing modern, efficient and safe schools for our students for generations to come.

Reminiscing

"Grandview Heights High School." Just seeing those words in print, and saying them aloud, brings so many memories. I grew up in this small suburban "village" of Grandview Heights and lived on the same street, in the same house, for 22 years, attended pre-school in the very first preschool classroom at First Community Church, and went through all 13 grades in the Grandview Heights School System.

Highlights of those years were meeting friends at the September Ox Roast; walking to the Grandview swimming pool; painting store fronts on Grandview Avenue. for Halloween; going to the movie theatre on Grandview Avenue; enjoying Romeo's and Leonardo's pizza on Friday nights after the game and Sunday night dinners; sodas at McKinley's Drug Store with friends; that small town feeling you always felt at Rife's Market; cruising Frish's Big Boy parking lot and hoping to see "that guy;" sledding riding on Urlin Hill; picnics at Wyman Woods; walking home from the pool through "the desert;" catching the bus at Wyandotte and First Ave to go shopping at Lazarus downtown; and walking 13 miles to school in 6' of snow every day all winter long!

Memories of the younger years at Edison Elementary include Brownies and Girl Scouts with Troop 755 and friendships and family. But, once I hit high school, a whole new world opened up to me. There were football games on Friday night in the Fall and basketball games in the Winter. There was Modern Dance, GAA Student Council,



Booster Club, Home Economics, FTA, Co-Ed Club, Girls Glee, Band and Orchestra (I was a member but didn't play an instrument), Bowling Club (which I proudly headed up my senior year), class plays and all-school musical productions. During my senior year, the school musical was "The Music Man." I played the Mayor's oldest daughter and also danced in the dance numbers.

There was homeroom in Mr. Davis's Biology room - always alphabetical with Backus, Ballard, Bell, Bosart and Butz. Not to forget, homecoming, prom and parties in the "Rook cabin" behind Sue White's house.

My three sisters were awarded the "Betty Crocker Homemaker" award when they were seniors at GHHS. I wasn't. My brother was Booster president his senior year. With 12 years difference between my oldest sister Betsy and my youngest sister Phoebe, I think I knew every student in

the school system graduating between the years 1958 - 1970. It was a great place to live, and the 60's were great times.

In college, I fell in love with the guy who lived one street over from my family's home. Ray Stegmeier '67 and I were married in the Presbyterian Church on Northwest Boulevard and bought our first house on Lincoln Road, the street where he grew up. Our three daughters were born while we lived there.

What prompted these memories was reading about the GHHSAA Scholarship recipients. While reminiscing about the activities and clubs that I was involved in at GHHS and the choices I had as a young woman graduating high school and starting college, I am delighted to know what is going on at Grandview now, including the clubs, activities and opportunities available for our students. I'm encouraged by how this great high school prepares them for beyond high school.

When I graduated, my career choices were teacher, nurse, or secretary. I chose teacher and had a successful career. These new graduates were involved

in Best Buddies, Youth to Youth Club, FIRST Robotics Team, Heart to Heart Food Pantry, Baking Club, Yarn Club, Woman to Woman, Safety View counselors, L.I.F.E. guards, Principal Advisory committee, Green Dot, Ski Club, Mentoring & More, Science Club (which they probably had back in the '60's, but I didn't know about it!) and more. They are going on to study environmental science, bio-medical/ bio-chemical sciences, architecture, pediatric psychiatry, policy analysis, and things I cannot even pronounce.

This makes me even more proud to say, "I am a GHHS graduate. I believe it is one of the top high schools in Ohio, from one of the most charming, welcoming and forward thinking small communities in the State."

Ray and I left Columbus in 1984 and moved to Northeast Ohio. I currently live in Stow, but get back to Grandview a couple of times each year to drive through the old neighborhood, visit friends who have stayed in the area, and reminisce about "the good old days at Grandview High." I am, and always will be, proud to be a Bobcat.

Keeping Tradition Alive: A 70-Year Celebration of the Cake Walk

In July 1940, Grandview Heights School District Superintendent W.C. Rohleder hired an instrumental music instructor who would "devote much of his time to the development of a school band." In September, 35 band parents held their first meeting to create an organization "to booster the formation of a high school band," and raise funds to purchase instruments. From the beginning, Grandview Heights Band Parents Association (GBPA)



was a co-ed group with leadership roles held by both men and women. It is now Grandview's largest booster organization and works to support Grandview band students in grades 5-12.

"Did You Ever See A Cake Walk?"

On Nov. 11, 1948, Tri-Village News contained a front-page article entitled, "Did You Ever See A Cake Walk?" The article invited residents to share in the fun at the Cake Walk in the high school auditorium and that the "entire family will enjoy the fun and the delicious home-made cakes you may win." Tickets for each walk around the ring were 10 cents and admission was free to encourage community attendance.

A Sweet Success

The first GBPA Cake Walk was so successful that, in 1952, the Cake Walk was held instead of the Card Party as the main spring band fundraiser. That Cake Walk also offered a square dance where the band played for a "walk" around the cake ring and then a square dance reel would be played for dancing. In 1953, admission was charged



for the first time – 25 cents. The 1953 Cake Walk was a combination of a cake walk, formal dance and 30-minute band concert. The 25-cent admission price remained the same for the next 46 years and stands at \$1 today.

Throughout the 1950s and early 1960s, the Cake Walk was a formal affair with volunteers and attendees dressed in dresses, suits and ties. Card tables with white linen tablecloths displayed beautiful cakes made by band families that could be won during each walk. Seating was set up for those to play cards or be served coffee and cake.

During this time, the Cake Walk grew from one to three walk rings, and raffle prizes were given away. In 1956, the Tri-Village News announced that the annual GBPA Cake Walk "has come to be a traditional community event." Due to its popularity and the dances held after the walks, the annual Cake Walk became the traditional first "date" for many sixth-grade

In 1980, the tradition of donating \$1 in exchange for the opportunity to direct the band for one walk began with 20-25 attendees paying to lead the band for one walk. In 2001, a cake decorating contest was introduced with categories for professional cakes, adults and students. Through it all, the cost to take a walk in one of the cake rings and to try to win a cake remained 10 cents a walk. It was not until 2003, 55 years after the Cake Walk began, that the price to participate in a walk increased to 20 cents. Even today, the cost to participate is still only three walks for \$1.00.

Other notable changes include the addition of cake bingo, t-shirts, and children's games and face painting. In 1999, the Cake Walk expanded to five rings with two devoted to younger children. A "Mother's Special" of a cupcake and milk for \$1 at the concession stand began in 2010. From 2010 to 2015, the Cake Walk had themes, such as the Beatles' Abbey Road cover and Norman Rockwell's Thanksgiving painting. In 2011, parents and faculty participated in a Flash Mob dance of the Time Warp from The Rocky Horror Picture Show (the video of this event can be viewed at <https://youtu.be/GeH3eWJib4U>). A special uniform ring in 2016 raised \$1278, earmarked just for new band uniforms. In 2018, a cupcake circle with numbers on the floor was introduced for kindergarten and preschool students.

Peace, Love and Cake

In the 1970s, doll cakes with the doll's dress made of cake became the rage along with spice cakes, carrot cakes and other non-traditional cakes. Store-bought cakes slowly replaced many homemade cakes. Dress at the Cake Walks became casual for the students, but formal for the parents. The Cake Walk expanded to four rings in 1976. The event was so popular that, during the 1972-73 school year, two Cake Walks were held - in October and March. The Junior High School band also began playing at the Cake Walk in 1972.

For the past 70 years, GHHS alumni, local businesses, community leaders, families and members of Grandview and Marble Cliff have supported the Cake Walk and Grandview's music programs. Every year, nearly 300 parents and band members volunteer their time and cakes, and more than 1,000 community members attend. It has been an unofficial spring "alumni



night" with many returning with children and grandchildren.

When you ask Grandview alumni about the Cake Walk, many will tell you if they have won a cake. They remember leaving empty handed or with a huge smile on their face after winning a cake (or two or more). Alums will also tell you that it has lasted for so long because it is a chance to catch up with neighbors and friends and enjoy some wholesome fun at very little cost.

I think the Cake Walk continues for 70 years because it reflects the values and priorities of Grandview and Marble Cliff, including the quality of the schools and pride in its bands and music programs. More than a fundraiser for the band, the Cake Walk has become an important community-wide event and a part of our community's uniqueness. The Cake Walk "is" Grandview Heights.

2019-20 Grandview Teacher of the Year

It wasn't long after she started attending school that Barb McCauley realized she wanted to stay in school for life.

"Ever since I was a little girl, I wanted to be a teacher," she said. "I just loved school, and in first and second grade, I was already saying, 'I'm going to be a teacher someday.'"

"I've been fortunate to be able to follow my dream," said McCauley, who teaches second grade at Stevenson Elementary School in Grandview Heights. "I count my blessings every day because I love what I do every day."

McCauley is starting her 31st year as a teacher, all working in Grandview Heights Schools.

She was announced as the district's 2018-19 Teacher of the Year on Aug. 13 at the annual staff convocation, held the day before the school year begins.

Learning she had been selected as Teacher of the Year "totally took me off guard. It was a total surprise," McCauley said. "I didn't know why I was being singled

out because I work with an amazing group of colleagues every day."

Teaching in Grandview involves collaboration, not only with other second-grade teachers but also with staff members throughout the district, she said.

"We have a lot of opportunities in Grandview for professional development and sharing ideas with our colleagues," McCauley said. "We're able to succeed as teachers because of the support we have from our school board, administrators, parents and the community."

"Grandview is a place where you want to teach, and once you're here, you never want to leave," she said.

McCauley and her husband, Jim, have three children who graduated from Grandview – Andy '13; Megan '15; and Joe '17.

During her 30-year career, McCauley was a kindergarten and reading-support teacher but has spent most of her time teaching second-graders. She earned a master's degree in education in 2008 and is a National Board Certified Teacher.

"What I love about teaching second grade is watching the sense of independence the students develop throughout the year," she said. "They start to recognize there's a world around them and what they do does impact others. They are beginning to develop a respect for others."

In second grade, students are beginning to "take ownership" of their learning, McCauley said. "One of my favorite things is when a student is sitting and reading and they start laughing

out loud themselves," she said. "That's a signal that they are enjoying reading and it's not work for them."

The most rewarding part of

teaching is witnessing the moment a student who is struggling through a process or trying to solve a problem "suddenly gets it," McCauley said. "The light bulb turns on and their face lights up – 'I got this!' That's what it's all about as a teacher," she said. "That's the reward you get all the time. It's always a great feeling to see them gaining independence as learners."

"What I hope is that my students are developing a sense of confidence and independence and problem-solving skills to keep them curious and wondering," McCauley said. "That will lead to more success as they progress through school and life." McCauley was nominated for the Teacher of the Year award by kindergarten teacher Joe Liptrap.

Liptrap said McCauley's "love for kids is always overwhelmingly present. I have witnessed countless occasions of her stopping everything she is doing to help a student that might not even be in her class."

"Barb always does the right thing and puts kids first, because she knows that it is what's right in her heart," Liptrap said. "She simply does it because she is always striving to be a light and make a positive impact in people's lives."

Ray Corbett

The Most Successful Boys' Basketball Coach In Grandview History

Ray Corbett will go down in the history of Grandview High School as the most successful boys' basketball coach ever. His record of 458 wins in 32 years will likely never be broken in the future.

Ray was born in 1957, the youngest of seven boys. He grew up in the Hilltop area of Columbus. According to older brother Dale, there was semi-organized chaos while the boys were growing up. Ray's six older brothers showed him no sympathy or empathy, and often beat the heck out of him in backyard games. This only made him a better basketball player later in life, as well as preparing him for an outstanding career in coaching.

Ray attended Bishop Ready where he played both basketball and baseball. Although not a "star" player, he had one outstanding skill set -- he was a really good defensive player, often assigned to the opponent's star player and leading scorer. During Ray's senior year, Ready took on their rival Grandview. The game included Grandview's leading scorer in Franklin County, Chris McCabe. Of course, Ray was assigned to guard McCabe and held him to 36 points, at the time a Grandview record. Grandview went on to beat Ready by 25 points. When Chris was inducted into Grandview's Athletic Hall of Fame years later, he attributed this feat as one of the primary reasons for his induction. Chris sends flowers every July 23rd on Ray's birthday.

After high school, Ray enrolled at OSU, majoring in comprehensive social studies as an

education major. He became an assistant coach at Bishop Wehrle and Jonathan Alder, coaching football, basketball and baseball. In 1986, he was named head basketball coach at Ready. He enjoyed two successful seasons before receiving a phone call from Grandview Athletic Director Larry Larson, who informed Ray the head basketball coaching position was open and offered Ray the job. At first, Ray declined but, after a few days of reflection, he changed his mind and accepted.

Thus, began the "Corbett Era" in Grandview basketball. Counting two years at Ready and now 32 years (and counting) at Grandview, Ray amassed a 458-249 record as head coach. This includes six league titles and six district titles. He produced

many "all-league," "all-district" and "all-state" players, including Jason Roberts, Phil and Todd Lovegrove, and Jake Larrison. His best two are current players Brian Collier and Luke Lachey. Both are four-year starters, seniors and headed to college athletic careers. Luke has a full scholarship to play football at Iowa (he was also recruited to play Division 1 basketball). Brian is being recruited by several Division 2 basketball programs.

One of Ray's most rewarding victories was the 1998 District Final against arch-rival Worthington Christian. He also cited many "best teams," but feels that his 1998/99 team was particularly outstanding, featuring Todd and Phil Lovegrove, Jake Larrison, Jason Roberts,

Justin Wendell and Brian Reasoner.

Ray is married to Martha and they have three children Andy, Tommy and Mary. Ray has long been considered one of the elite boys' basketball coaches in Central Ohio. He is respected by his peers and many of his assistant coaches were former head coaches, who, upon retiring, wanted to be associated with Ray. Only three other coaches earned the same respect as Ray in terms of number of victories: Bob Miller '59 at Thomas Worthington; Ed Kalo at Westerville South; and Tom Petty at Bloom Carroll.

Larry Larson says that Ray was one of his best hires (the other one being football coach Bill Brown) and Ray's devotion to his players, enthusiasm for the

game, and dedication to the sport of basketball set him apart from most other coaches. Larry says that as good a coach that Ray is, he's even a better human being.

Phil Lovegrove, captain of the basketball team in 1998 and a member of the Athletic Hall of Fame, describes Ray as a "player's coach." He says Ray was always devoted to his players as well as basketball itself. He paid as much attention to the "bench players" as he did to the starting five. He expected the best of his players at every practice and his enthusiasm was contagious. Phil said practices were harder and more intense than the actual games.

Ray retired from teaching six years ago, but continues to coach. Grandview is blessed to have Ray represent the school with such class. He, being humble, never mentioned that he was twice voted Ohio AP Coach of the Year. His legacy will last long after he retires from coaching.



Free Income Tax Preparation and Filing

In conjunction with the IRS, your local AARP supports Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) or Tax Counseling for the Elderly (TCE) Programs. The service is safe, secure and free to all taxpayers regardless of age or income.

Bring in your federal and Ohio state tax information and AARP volunteers will complete both tax returns. They'll be verified, securely e-filed directly with the IRS and Ohio State and you'll receive a copy.

Tax sites usually open in early February. For locations of VITA/TCE sites and operation times, visit https://www.aarp.org/money/taxes/aarp_taxaide/ This web address will be active mid-January through April. Enter your zip code and a map will appear with nearby tax sites. Click on the site FLAG to see dates of operation and method: APPOINTMENT or WALK-IN.


